

## President's Welcome

Welcome to the 59th annual conference of the Mormon History Association! After more than twenty years of absence, our association has returned to Kirtland, Ohio, a cradle of early Mormon history. Northeastern Ohio witnessed some of the most formative events in early Latter Day Saints culture, from bold communal experiments to the creation of a sacerdotal church structure. In Kirtland, early Mormons succeeded in building their first "House of the Lord," the Kirtland Temple, a structure that



stands today as the oldest extant worship building for any Latter Day Saint tradition. Beyond these far-reaching institution-building events, the "Kirtland period" of early Mormon history was rife with conflict over things both extraordinary and mundane, including debates on the afterlife, church leadership disputes, religious conversion clashes, contention over business interests, and failed banking experiments.

Our conference theme for this year, "conversions, aversions, and reversions" nods to these historical confluences and conflicts from the 1830s, but broadens the temporal and topical scope to include all of Mormon history. Presenters during our concurrent sessions will give papers that highlight topics that range from nineteenth-century Mormon electoral politics to UFOs and twentieth-century Latter-day Saint respectability politics. Other presenters will relate Tongan Mormon transpacific histories, while still others will think about meaning and meaning-making of sacred textiles in everyday Mormon life. The program committee chairs, Cristina Rosetti and Esiteli Hafoka, have assembled a truly capacious conference program, welcoming diverse topics and scholars from all backgrounds.

Featured keynote speakers will stretch the bounds of materials and methods in Mormon history. Elder Kyle S. McKay will talk about the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints' recent acquisition of the Kirtland Temple and restoration of the Joseph and Emma Smith home. Taking a material culture approach, Janiece Johnson will speak about Kirtland Mormons and their use of the Book of Mormon. Charlotte Hansen Terry will talk about Mormon women and identity in the nineteenth-century Pacific. Jana Riess will analyze a more contemporary topic and report on her findings about so-called "Jack Mormons" or liminal Latter-day Saints in the last fifty years. In the Smith-Pettit lecture, Northwestern University's Robert Orsi will offer a wide-ranging theoretically grounded talk about religion's sanctification of sexuality. Following this, a panel of scholars, including Ignacio Garcia, Vinna Chowriamah, Sujey Vega, Elise Boxer, and Chiung Hwang Chen, will address the intersection of race and religion in the writing of Mormon history. Finally, our MHA Sunday devotional will feature former Kirtland Temple site director, Barbara Walden, at the Kirtland Temple. She will speak about the temple's many caretakers and interpreters across the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

No MHA conference happens without a team of members working to make it possible. MHA Executive Director, Christine Blythe, has been the hub around which everything about this conference has revolved – planning, emails, Zoom meetings, and contract negotiations. She is an organizer who would give Saul Alinsky a run for his money! Local arrangement chairs Seth Bryant and William Wynder connected us to the local people and organizations invested in the religious history of Northeastern Ohio.

Seth and Bill, assisted by Erik Freeman, Mark Staker, and incoming MHA President Andrea Radke-Moss, have also created two outstanding pre- and post-conference tours, featuring Mormon women's history and Mormons and communal societies. Finally, the MHA board has been a constant ally in helping to facilitate everything from awards committees to our budget.

On a personal note, MHA's conference in Kirtland represents something of a homecoming for me. For parts of twelve summers from 2004 to 2016, I lived in Kirtland, researched about the temple's history as a pilgrimage site, and taught an evening college-credit history course to the Community of Christ's summer guides who staffed the Kirtland Temple. At night, I would walk from the Joseph and Emma Smith home where I stayed, past the old cemetery and temple, to the Community of Christ Visitor Center where I taught. Today, of course, none of this is the same. (What home is the same after you leave it?) Nonetheless, I feel welcome here. I hope in the coming days that you will, too. Welcome to Kirtland. Welcome home.

## Welcome to "Historic Kirtland" and Beautiful Northeastern Ohio

We extend a warm welcome to the attendees of the 2024 Mormon History Association Conference titled "Conversions, Aversion, and Reversion: Mormon Identity from Ohio to Utah." Given the recent transfers between the Community of Christ and The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, your visit to Northeastern Ohio and to what was the first Headquarters of the newly emerging "Church of Christ" will be of particular interest to one and all.

Prior to the arrival of Europeans, Northeastern Ohio was home to Erie, Seneca, Mississauga, and other Indigenous peoples, and later designated as the Connecticut Western Reserve. Between 1831 and 1838, Kirtland was home to a growing Latter-day Saint community. As Joseph Smith and his restorationist movement moved west from upstate New York, early adherents came to a region already known for the communitarianism of Shakers, Owenites, and the Harmony Society. A revelation to Joseph Smith Jr. designated Ohio as a place of endowment like Pentecost in the Book of Acts, realized through the sacred space known as the Kirtland Temple.

The high point of the dedication was followed by economic difficulty and the first major schism in the Latter-day Saint movement. The Kirtland Safety Society collapsed in 1837 concomitant to the national financial crisis known as the Panic of 1837, but for the Latter-day Saints it had repercussions well beyond the financial losses experienced by depositors.

Within Mormon history, Kirtland affords scholars a unique opportunity to explore the rapid development of restorationist liturgy, its evolving theology, to learn of the people who joined the movement, its early detractors, and to study the everyday experiences in the lives of ordinary members of the faith.

As a part of your conference experience, we encourage you to explore early 19th Century life in Ohio through the pre-conference and post-conference tours being offered. We will visit Amish and Mennonite country, explore a Shaker museum, visit the Morley Farm, home of "the family," to consider this early effort at communalism, and travel to Zoar Village and explore its early connections with Mormonism. There will be two opportunities to tour LDS Historic Kirtland sites, worship in the Kirtland Temple, all while being interpreted by scholars of Community of Christ and Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saint history.

We congratulate the Mormon History Association, and its leadership, for what has turned out to be a most fortuitous selection of a conference venue and topics. This summer's conference will combine an impressive list of presenters with the opportunity to explore the early efforts at communitarianism in frontier America.

## MHA Code of Conduct

We do not tolerate discrimination, harassment, bullying, or racism in any form. All members, participants, exhibitors, and volunteers at MHA-sponsored events are expected to treat others with respect, dignity, civility, and kindness.

#### **Unacceptable behaviors** include, but are not limited to:

Catholicism and Mormonism, separately and, often enough, together, in pernicious comparison, have been repeatedly framed as paradigmatically bad religions vis-à-vis the normative category, "modern," specifically, "modern American," religion. As such, precisely as outliers and necessary others, Mormonism and Catholicism contributed fundamentally to the making of "modern American religion," and of "good" religion generally. And of all the many reasons why Catholicism and Mormonism have been so construed, the most damning has had to do with sexuality. This lecture proposes to use the histories of Mormonism and Catholicismas lived religions and as anxious creations of the modern religious imaginary—to examine some alternative possibilities for thinking about religion and sexuality.

## Awards

#### LEONARD J. ARRINGTON AWARD

Awarded annually to a scholar whose contributions are truly outstanding for distinguished service to Mormon history. The selection committee will consider the influence of certain individual works by nominees for this award, as well as their cumulative records of meritorious scholarship in general. Awarded since 1999, this award is named and given in memory and recognition of a founding father of the Mormon History Association and premier mentor and promoter of Mormon history.

#### **SPECIAL CITATIONS**

Presented to persons or institutions who have made a significant contribution to Mormon history.

#### BEST BOOK AWARD (\$2,000)

#### **Endowed by Ken Demas**

Awarded for the best book published on Mormon history. Given to honor and encourage the sense of purpose, dedication, excellence of study, research and scholarship in the field of Mormon history. Endowed by Ken Demas, a longtime supporter of the University of Utah History Department and friend of Mormon Studies, who left a generous bequest to fund a \$2,000 annual award for the best book published in Mormon history.

## THE ELLA L. TURNER AWARD FOR BEST BIOGRAPHY (\$1,500) Sponsored by the Turner and Bergera Families

Awarded for the best published biography in the field of Mormon history. Funded in honor of Ella Larsen Turner, a published historian and genealogist, and her daughter, Ella Ruth Turner Bergera, a published family historian, novelist, and poet.

### ARDIS E. PARSHALL PUBLIC HISTORY AWARD (\$500) Honoring Ardis E. Parshall

Endowed by Kelly and Heather Stone and many other MHA Members Awarded annually to a public history project related to Mormonism that contributes new insight, demonstrates rigorous scholarship, engages primarily with a public outside of the academy, portrays complexity and diversity in respectful ways, and broadens the field of public history. The award honors Ardis E. Parshall, a pioneer in Mormon Studies public history.

#### **BEST ARTICLE AWARD (\$500)**

#### Endowed by Armand Mauss and many other MHA Members

The Jan Shipps Best Article Award is given to the published article or essay that best exemplifies the legacy of one of MHA's most important founders, scholars, and leaders. Overall quality is a crucial consideration, as well as an author's use of interdisciplinary tools, interpretive innovation, and/or incorporation of distinct Mormon traditions.

## THE LAVINA FIELDING ANDERSON AWARD FOR BEST ARTICLE PUBLISHING IN THE JOURNAL OF MORMON HISTORY (\$500) Sponsored by Anonymous

Awarded for best article published in MHA's Journal of Mormon History, as determined by the JMH Board of Editors.

#### BEST ARTICLE ON MORMON WOMEN'S HISTORY (\$450) Sponsored by Mormon Women's History Initiative Team

#### **Junctions and Communities**

Ogden, Utah: June 5-8, 2025


The Mormon History Association invites you to Ogden, Utah for its sixtieth annual conference to be held June 5-8, 2025. Situated on the Ogden and Weber Rivers near where they join the Great Salt Lake, and nicknamed "Junction City" when it became the connecting point between numerous railroad lines, Ogden has long been a site of junctions. Long before Latter-day Saints dreamed of an American Zion in the Great Basin, ancestors of Shoshone and other indigenous peoples criss-crossed the region, establishing trade networks and sharing languages, settlements, and cultures.

Ogden highlights a confluence of events and dynamics that shaped Mormon settlement, identity, and culture, and ensured that the tradition would always be intertwined with the wider world. The railroad especially brought diverse groups to Ogden. Wealthy investors and industrialists as well as Black Americans and Chinese, Japanese, German, and Irish immigrants were drawn to the burgeoning railroad town and its economic opportunities, bringing greater influence from the margins. They built communities that both constituted and contradicted centers of Latter-day Saint power, resulting in diversity, and alternative directions. Conversely, families like Apostle Franklin D. and Jane S. Richards represented Ogden's influence on the highest levels of the church.


In the 20th century, international and national events continued to encourage convergence at Ogden. World War II brought a military base, prisoner of war camps, and defense industries. Later immigration trends further heightened the diverse influences and people that would shape Utah and today's global church. Influenced by outside elements, Ogden's Mormon community continued to develop a unique religious and cultural brand that included diverse politics and a cultural presence perhaps best represented by the Osmonds, as well as iconic Mormon composer Janice Kapp Perry. Ogden also produced several prominent western historians including Fawn Brodie, Bernard Devoto, and more recently Thomas Alexander, a founding member of MHA.

While distance and distinction from others are popular tropes in the telling of Mormon histories, gathering in "Junction City" invites us to widen the lens and remember the many histories of interaction and influence that have shaped and been shaped by Restoration traditions. Ogden's Union Station embodies the variety of these historical junctures, sitting as it does at the intersection of Wall Avenue's business world and 25th Street's demimonde history. Our 2025 theme, "Conjunctions and Communities," invites presentations that explore the Restoration movement as a hub of internally intersecting variation with a history long enmeshed in broader worlds, contexts, and contingencies. We encourage scholars to reconsider points of convergence in the Latter-day Saint past, to explore coalitions and crossroads, and to be open to approaches that creatively join methodologies and fields.

The deadline for proposals is November 1, 2024. Submit your proposal to the program co-chairs through the Google form accessible via the MHA homepage. 
The exhibition is organized by the Church History Museum and the Center for Latterday Saint Arts, whose donors helped make the exhibition possible.






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
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




















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
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
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


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
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


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


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


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
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
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
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


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
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
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
